John (Hebrew) meaning 'God is gracious'

John Francis Hay was born on 30th May 1947, in Buxton, the eldest son of Ted and Felicity. The young family lived in Sheffield until 1949, when they moved to Nottingham, by which time John's younger brother, Charles, had been born. The family was completed with the arrival of Anthony in 1953.

John attended the former St. Mary's primary school in Derby Road before being sent away, aged just 8, to a small Benedictine boarding school in the Peak District. At age 11, John went on to The Becket School in Nottingham where he would, one day, return as a teacher. He continued his studies at Loughborough University.

John met Ann Woodhead whilst she was teaching in Nottingham and John was a student, working various factory jobs to support himself. They lived in adjacent bedsits in Vickers Street and he wooed her with his culinary talents! During this time, he was Master of Ceremonies at St. Barnabas Cathedral, where he had been a parishioner, chorister and alter server.

A teaching position for Ann and a place at teacher training college for John took the young couple to South London. They lived in Blackheath and were married on 2nd August 1969 at Our Lady of Grace Church, Charlton. This year would have been their Golden Wedding Anniversary.





John and Ann returned to Nottingham in 1971. They bought the only house they ever owned and made 400 Woodborough Road their home, hoping to fill it with children. Thomas arrived on Christmas Day 1972, followed by Nicholas in 1975 and Ruth in 1978. Whilst expecting Thomas, John fully immersed himself into life in his new, local parish of St. Augustine's.

The Hay family's life revolved around the church and John was actively involved in parish life for the next 48 years. His contributions included fundraising events through parish barbecues and parish suppers; being a Eucharistic minister, a confirmation catechist, registrar duties, reading, doing the collection and count and, of course, singing! John was a man of great faith and he loved his life within the faith community of St. Augustine's. There was never doubt in John's mind about where he was heading, "all this, and heaven too!"

John's vocation as a teacher took him to many Nottingham schools, also FE colleges and teaching within the prison service. He loved teaching and sharing his knowledge with anyone and everyone. His belief and gift in storytelling aided his teaching career and allowed him to be 'a Man for All Seasons'; John could relate to anyone, quickly finding common ground with his many stories, jokes and anecdotes.

John joined the Catenian Association in the 1970s, spending many years as secretary. He was president of Nottingham 20 circle when they celebrated their 1000th meeting. He drew great faith, friendship and support from his Catenian brothers throughout his life, and he remained an active member until his death.





John was a well-known man of the community. He was heavily involved in the Nottingham Interfaith Council, dabbled in local politics, involved in Alexandra Park events, Becket Former Scholars, a regular at the Nottingham Playhouse and, of course, enjoying the pubs of Nottingham! Over the years, 'Trilby John', frequented, among others, The Coach and Horses, The Turf Tavern, Langtry's, the Rose of England and his local pub, The Duke of Cambridge, where his own silver tankard still hangs.

John absolutely loved being a Grandpa, and was very eager to become one! He was incredibly proud of all his grandchildren: Donal, Matthew, Rory, Isaac, Anna, Eli and Peter. He drew such joy from spending time with them and watching them grow.

John lived life to the full and continued to do so even when his health was deteriorating. He loved his family and was very proud of us all. Ann was the love of his life and the whole family was left devastated when she died in October 2016. Despite this, John demonstrated tremendous courage, strength, fortitude and faith during this time. He remained positive throughout his considerable health problems, retaining a zest for life and strong will to live and to love right until the end.

John was admitted to hospital in April 2019. He was very poorly, but remained eager and focused on returning home to 400. Very tragically, John had a fall on his 72nd birthday, whilst still in hospital, which resulted in his death the following day, 31st May 2019. His three children were with him to say a last goodbye, as John left us to join Ann in paradise.


We will take John's mortal remains for burial at Wilford Hill Cemetery.
