
Mother Wright you have fought the good fight, you have finished the race, you have kept the faith. Rest in the bosom of Jesus.



We are here to celebrate the life of Mrs Lilla Euelee Wright. Mrs Wright was the eldest of five siblings, first of five children born in the parish of Manchester, Jamaica.

Mrs Wright is survived by two sisters Ethel Meikle and Winsome (Dell) Butler. She was predeceased by her only brother David Reid and her younger sister Marjorie Gordon.

She lived her martial live in Jamaica, and after the death of her husband she immigrated to UK in 1964.

Mrs Wright survived by three of her four children; Philip, Lassel and Pauline. Sadly the forth child Elaine passed away in 2015. The rest of the family left behind are 10 grandchildren, 12 greatgrandchildren and four great-great grandchildren, plus nieces, nephews, cousins, church family and many friends.

Mrs Wright was a very good mother to her children. She was always willing to help others in whatever way she could. She enjoyed telling people "such is life, or take it as it comes."

During her very long-life Mrs Wright has resided in Jamaica, Canada and the United Kingdom. It was after her return to the UK in the 1980s that she was baptised in Chester Green into membership of the (former Normanton) and now Derby Bethel Seventh-day Adventist Church.

Her home in Dover Court was always a regular venue for church prayer meetings. She will always be fondly remembered as a happy Christian with that lovely smile of hers. She also enjoyed crochet and knitting and tried to teach her grandchildren, as well as the card game Donkey.

Many visitors to Mrs Wright's home have enjoyed her hospitality as she always offered a slice of her homemade sweet potato pudding, accompanied with a drink and would never let them leave without giving them a gift. Even though Mrs Wright had to endure her joints pain in her later years, her faith in God was never diminished, as she always gave thanks for her voice that she was still able to praise her God.

Mrs Wright lived a very long and happy Christian life. The Good Lord lent her to us for 104 years, and on the 19th of January 2021 he saw fit to call her to her rest.

She will be missed by all if us but never forgotten. We will continue "taking it as it comes, because such is life."
